KIDNEY KIDS KAN TABS PROJECT

The wine caps are slowly mounting up as well as pull tabs. Kidney Kids is a non-profit organisation which was founded in 1990 to provide emotional support and help to parents of children with kidney disorders, it doesn't mean that by collecting the pull tabs and wine capsules you are helping to pay for dialysis treatment Our tax dollar pays for it. Approx. 1200 plus New Zealand children require dialysis treatment per year or additional support from The Kidney kids project. The slogan

"A can pull tab is worth a second in the life of a child on a dialysis machine: This slogan adopted by the support of the Southern Lions club members first. Then it grows into the 202E area. Most Lions clubs are collecting pull tabs and wine capsules in the 202E area. Greymouth Pakahe Lions took out the trophy at the last convention.

As well collecting pull tabs wine capsules the pull tabs on salmon and tuna tins made of aluminium are collected and then sold for the metal content. About 3600 pull tabs are required to make a kilo. It's not much for each person but the children will collectively benefit a lot. The Havelock Hotel continues to help us collecting wine capsules and tabs for us also a Resene tin is at the Havelock Fire Brigade. Resene Paints also came on board with supplying red, Black and White tins for putting the tabs in over the years every time you open a can, tear off the tab and place it in your pocket then into the Kan tabs tins where ever you see one.... somewhere in New Zealand a sick child will thank you.

If you want to you can drop yours pull tabs or wine capsules to our place and we will make sure that Blenheim Lions receive them.

DISTRICT 202E AWARDED DISTRICT EXCELLENCE AWARD: 2015-16 YEAR

Announced at the District Convention District 202E was awarded the District Excellence Award following advice from Lions Clubs International.

The Excellence Award is an achievement not only for the district, but also for the clubs that the district supports. It advances community service, membership growth and leadership development.

There are two types of requirements. Required achievements are mandatory and reflect the aims in the Club Excellence Award. The second section lists 25 options. Your district can choose ten achievements that address the unique needs of the clubs within 202E.

Upon achieving the requirements, the then District Governor (IPDG John Rodger) was able to recognize certain members of the DG Team, Zone and region chairpersons receive a handsome lapel pin while you and your vice district governors, GMT Coordinator, GLT Coordinator, Treasurer, Secretary, LCIF Coordinator and Cabinet Chair Community Services received a prestigious medal.

Here are a few details about the award.

REQUIRED ACHIEVEMENTS: All five requirements must be met to qualify!

Five Elements of Excellence - The requirements below are the same requirements outlined in the Club Excellence Award, but adjusted for the district governor team.

- 1. SERVICE To qualify, 90% of the clubs in the district must conduct a service project
- 2. MEMBERSHIP The district must achieve a net increase in membership or charter a new club. Members are needed to support projects and events such as Just Ask, Club Quality Initiative, Membership Satisfaction, New Club Development Guide.
- 3. COMMUNICATION -A district governor team member must visit the officers of each club during a single or multiple club event.

One of the most important roles as a district governor team is to communicate regularly with the clubs and the leaders in the district. Team Approach to Club Visits – This helpful guide outlines the benefits of sharing club visits with your team and tips that make sharing visits successful!

4. LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT - The district must provide training and mentoring for club officers and other current and potential leaders.

Ongoing leadership development is critical for the long-term success of the district. LCI offers plenty of material for both position specific training or leadership development to help each leader reach his or her potential.


5. CLUB DEVELOPMENT - Ninety percent (90%) or more of the clubs are active and in good standing.

ADDITIONAL ACHIEVEMENTS: In addition to the required achievements noted above, the district completed 15 of 20 achievements. (Only 10 achievements are needed to receive the award.) Some of these achievements include

- Host a new member orientation to strengthen commitment and retention;
- Host a Certified Guiding Lion Seminar;
- Host an Extension Workshop or plan an extension initiative
- Achieve a net increase in membership and charter a new club
- Charter a new Leo club
- Conduct Club Officer Training
- Conduct District Officer Training
- Check the Club Health Assessment to ensure that 90% of the clubs submit a Membership Report by the end of the year
- Check the Club Health Assessment to ensure that 100% of the clubs submit the Club Officer Report (PU-101) before the close of the year.
